CMS to Provided MFP Program Funding

The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) announced this week that it will offer more than \$110 million to expand access to home and community-based services (HCBS) through Medicaid's Money Follows the Person (MFP) program. MPF support people who choose to transition out of institutions and back into their homes and communities. Several States have used this program to transition people living with brain injury in nursing homes to community-based programs.

The new **Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO)** makes individual awards of up to \$5 million available for more than 20 States and Territories not currenting participating in the MFP. These funds will support initial planning and implementation to get the State/Territory programs off the ground.

CMS also announced that States which are already participating in MFP will receive increased reimbursement rate for MFP supplemental services. These services will now be 100% federally funded with no State share. CMS is also expanding the definition of supplemental services to include additional services, including short-term housing and food assistance. HHS Holds Stakeholders Roundtable to Discuss Nursing Home Reforms

On Wednesday, March 30, 2022, Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) Secretary Xavier Becerra hosted a roundtable with stakeholders to discuss the <u>nursing home reforms</u> President Biden announced on February 18 and reiterated during his State of the Union address. The roundtable discussed nursing home staffing requirements, ideas for workforce development and retention, and COVID-19 booster shots. Secretary Becerra and roundtable participants reiterated the need to improve quality of care for residents and working conditions for staff.

The roundtable discussed the relationship between better care and higher staffing levels and delved into data-driven examples of how staffing increases can yield significant positive impacts. Secretary Becerra and roundtable participants also discussed the importance of investing in staff development to bolster retention of nursing home employees. The group underscored the importance of creating a culture that emphasizes that this is a "careforce" not a workforce. View the <u>press release</u> for more information.

SSA Announces New Online Tool for Applying for SSI

The Social Security Administration (SSA) has released a <u>new online tool</u> that applicants and individuals assisting applicants can use to request an appointment to apply for Social Security

Income (SSI). This request creates a protective filing date – which is used to determine when an individual can start receiving SSI benefits – as long as application is submitted within 60 days.

CMS Releases Informational Bulletin on Enforcement Discretion

Today, the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) released a CMS informational bulletin that informs State Medicaid agencies that CMS is exercising enforcement discretion during the COVID-19 public health emergency with regard to State submissions of updated Medicaid access monitoring review plans (AMRPs). CMS is delaying enforcement of the updated AMRPs that are due by October 1, 2022 until October 1, 2024. Learn more **here**.
