

- 15 Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities Research Centers (IDDRCs)








What do UCEDDs do?



- Connect the University with the community
- Use current scientific findings to bring solutions to real world problems



What do UCEDDs do?



- Help form practical ideas and solutions to problems
- Give real world experience for trainees
- Give the community chances to help teach professionals



UCEDD Core Functions (Title 1, Subtitle A & D of DD Act)

- Provide interdisciplinary pre-professional training & continuing education
- Provide training & technical assistance
- Provide community services including training and technical assistance, model and demonstration services. Clinical services are optional.
 - Community, state & national levels
 - Individuals, families, professionals, policymakers, schools, systems
- Conduct basic & applied research, including program evaluation and public policy analysis
- Disseminate best practices & research results



About LENDs



Leadership Education in Neurodevelopmental & Related Disabilities (LEND)

- MCHB funded: work with Title V agencies
- Ensure health care professionals have leadership skills & most current knowledge
- Provide interdisciplinary clinical services at university & community settings
- Address unique needs children with special health care needs & their families
- Promote cultural competency, family-based care & interdisciplinary partnerships



IDDRC Accomplishments


- Have contributed to discovery, prevention and treatment of 40+ disorders that cause mental & physical disabilities



2014

Contractor on the TBI federal grant to provide training and to conduct grant evaluation

2016

Contracted by the Disability law Center for the TABI Legal Needs Assessment

2018

Awarded 3-year TBI SPP grant and focused on the needs assessments and data, rebuilding the advisory council, creating the state planning, and developing training and outreach clinics.

2021

Awarded 5-year TBI SPP grant to continue work on data, the advisory council, state planning, screening, and training.

BENEFITS TO PARTNERING WITH A UCEDD OR LEND PROGRAM

UCEDDs bridge the gap between University and Community

- Research and Evaluation, e.g. Incidence Data, Needs Assessments, and Program Evaluation
- Training and Workforce Development
- Specific services or knowledge and programs, <u>e.g.</u>
 employment, education, policy

LEND Programs provide graduate level training on Neurodevelopmental Disabilities

- Present on brain injury to LEND Fellows
- Include LEND Fellows in brain injury screening events
- Support LEND Fellows in their leadership projects
